From 27 September to 29th inclusive, Prof Giovanni Orsi (of the INGV) and the Earth Sciences Section have organised an optional excursion.


What the excursion includes: The field trip will last three days, each of which will be devoted to one of the three Nea-

politan active volcanoes. Expert archaeologists will join geologists in leading the visit of specific archaeological sites. The trip will not include strenuous walking.

For the first two days we will use a bus, while the third day we will sail from Naples to Ischia and

back by hydrofoil and will circumnavigate the island by boat.

COST: The cost for each participant is Euro 360.00 and includes hotel accommodation (room and breakfast) for three nights, basket lunch, transportation (bus, hydrofoil and boat), and a field trip guidebook.



Interaction between Volcanoes and Humans—Field Trip Programme

27th September: Day one

Depart by bus from Hotel at 08:30am

Stop 1. The Osservatorio Vesuviano historical building (on the way to the Vesuvius crater)

- Introduction to the geology of the Neapolitan volcanoes and the monitoring system of the INGV-Osservatorio Vesuviano

- Short visit of the exhibition "The Vesuvius: 2000 years of observations"

Stop 2. Crater of Vesuvius

- The 1944 last eruption of the volcano

- See and discuss the relationships between active volcanoes and urbanization

Stop 3. Pompeii excavations

- The AD 79 eruption and its effects on a town

- Human life in the Campanian region at the time of the eruption

Return to Hotel at 6pm

28th September: Day 2

Depart by bus at 08:30am

Stop 4. General view of the Campi Flegrei caldera

- Discussion of the major features (large caldera-forming eruptions,

caldera collapses, post caldera volcanic activity, caldera resurgence up to the last bradyseismic events)

Stop 5. Verdolino valley

- The caldera-forming eruptions. Geometrical relationships among Campanian Ignimbrite, Neapolitan Yellow Tuff and interposed deposits.

Stop 5. Solfatara

- The crater of a recent volcanic edifice

- The fumarole and boiling mud activity: implication on the geothermal system of the caldera

Stop 6. Serapeo marketplace and Pozzuoli harbour

- Ongoing short-term deformation in a resurgent caldera

- Human life in the Phlegraean area and interaction with volcanism

- Naturalistic aspects of the area

Stop 7. Averno lake

- General view of the crater of the Averno 2 eruption, one of the most recent event of the caldera, which was a bay during Roman time and till the 1538 AD Monte Nuovo eruption, the last of the caldera.

Stop 8. The "Rione Terra",

The ancient part of the town of Pozzuoli evacuated during the 1970 unrest episode and presently an open-air museum.

Return to Hotel at 6pm

Symposium announcement:

“From Information to Knowledge; from Knowledge to Wisdom:
challenges and changes facing higher education in the digital age”

Venue: The Wenner Gren Centre, Stockholm

When: 5th–7th November, 2009

Rationale:

The traditional model of higher education is inappropriate for the new context and challenges of the 21st century. European universities are rapidly becoming “mass” and “multi-purpose” institutions. This trend is paralleled by globalisation and the exponential increase of information, the flow, diffusion, and use of which is hard to monitor and control. A major responsibility of higher education institutions is to guide students’ learning in such a way that they are able to selectively process and transform information into deep conceptual knowledge networks. They should acquire competence, beliefs and attitudes for using their knowledge in adaptive, responsible, and creative ways in new situations, which is a major component of wisdom. Institutions of higher education must learn how to deal with the

impact of this massive increase of retrievable information and the explosive development of its digital archiving and access. What are the consequences of these ongoing developments for the role of science in the knowledge and learning society of the future?

Prof. David Perkins (Graduate School of Education, Stanford University) will present a keynote address on the theme: Clarifying the concepts ‘information’, ‘knowledge’, ‘wisdom’, and their relationships

Subscriptions for 2009 are now due

During May and June, all members who are eligible to pay an annual subscription were sent will receive a letter and payment instructions from the Treasurer. This year, the Council have agreed to a single figure for all members—120€ (Euros).

Those exempted from the annual subscription include: Members aged 75 and over; Honorary members and Foreign members and members that have paid a lifetime subscription. Exempted members retain all rights of membership.

All members may request from the Treasurer, an annual exemption, where their personal circumstances make payment difficult. If members have been granted an exemption in the last year, a further request must be made.

Member's subscriptions do not go towards general overhead costs of running the office in London.

This year 65% of members subscriptions will be used to support the following benefits for members:

- The Academy's peer reviewed journal "The European Review"; the Burgen Scholarships and the annual award of the Erasmus Medal and its accompanying lecture; involvement of the Academia in the work of the European Academies Science Advisory Council (EASAC); free or subsidised conferences and workshops; newsletters and other communications.

The remaining 35% will be allocated to a Section budget, that can be used by the Sections for their own activities.

Please try to pay your subscription as soon as possible and certainly by the end of December 2009.

Members that have not paid will receive a reminder in October.
